



💻 Costa Rica

Je had a very special and significant meeting with a man named Farid Udd, a representative of the Grameen Bank, Farid is from Bangladesh but is currently in Costa Rica, away from his family for 3 years. to oversee the loans in the Limon province. A quiet, gentle, humble man, Farid explained the lending system: the different kinds of loans available, who they were available to, interest, outstanding payments, success rates, etc. All I can say is that Professor Yunus is brilliant-the wisdom and compassion he exudes just might be able to accomplish the extraordinary mission of eliminating global poverty.

We then met with a group of women who had received loans and listened eagerly to their success stories. One Of Micro-credit woman named Alice has used her loan to buy pigs. Another woman started up her own jeweiry business. The matrianch of the group sold little

cactus plants. One lady started a specialized manicure business. It was all very inspiring. Their main request or hope for the future was to get bigger loans to pay for all the things needed in initial start up costs. However, many of the women have successfully paid their loans back and therefore were able to receive second larger loans.

One thing that I found interesting was that they were only providing loans to residents of that particular province. Because Whole Planet is closely tied with EARTH University, Grameen chose to lend to that particular area because of its connection with Whole Foods. Our company has such vast influence and has been incredibly magnanimous with its power to help. It really gave me a genuine sense of pride to see what incredible organizations Whole Foods has lent the real deal.
